



The Occoquan Historical Society is appealing to you or an organization to adopt a historical marker at a cost of \$912.50. This fee covers the cost of restoration, replacement of graphics if necessary and shipping.

You already care about Occoquan and belonging to our history. Refurbishing a marker makes our history known not only to town guests but for residents as well and, most importantly, keeps our history alive.

You have a choice to adopt any one of 14 markers (except for the one in front of the Museum which the Occoquan Historical restored in 2016). Before and after photos show a great improvement.

The new paint process is more durable and resistant to fading and chipping.

In 2000, all of the markers were purchased and owned by the Town of Occoquan. The historical society is currently stepping forward to assist in the restoration project.



Five markers need restoration, about six are faded and peeling, and those remaining are in fairly good condition. We hope to have at least one restored this year with your donation--the donor gets to choose which one. However, markers are listed below in order of most needed for restoration, but you can choose your favorite.

- Methodist Church (Town Hall)
- Mill Street (Golden Goose)
- Ogle Harris' Store (Yarn Shop)
- 1804 Boundary Stone (at end of lane between Madigan's and Victorian Shops)
- Occoquan Wharves (Mamie Davis Park)
- Old Hammil Hotel (on Commerce St. by brick building at corner of Union St.)
- Rockledge (in lot on Mill St. at front of Rockledge)
- 1804 Occoquan Town Plat (Visitors Center)
- Ebenezer Baptist Church
- Occoquan River Bridges (Mill River Park)
- Odd Fellows Hall (308 Commerce)
- Commerce Street (309 commerce)
- The Dogue Indians (in storage to be mounted near Footbridge)
